CELL PHONES FOR SOLDIERS PROGRAM

The MOAA *Cell Phones for Soldiers Program* has been extended to January 31, 2012, so we are still looking for old cell phones to turn into phone cards for deployed service members to call home. Our monthly Chapter meetings are starting again in September, so remember to bring them with you, or if you cannot attend, call me (Donna Morrison) at 683-6219, and I will arrange to have the phone picked up from you. Check with your friends and family – they may have phones to donate. Donation receipts are available if you need them for income tax purposes.



MILITARY ID CARDS

The ID Card/DEERS facility, located in Building 795, changed from the walk-in system to an appointment-only system in July. Reports are that the system is working so well that times are filling up, and walk-ins are being sent to the Reserve and National Guard facilities for cards. I had occasion to use the system recently and was amazed at how fast and efficient the procedure is now! In place of the Social Security numbers, my new card now has a DOD ID Number and a Benefits Number. Remember that in places such as the Pharmacy, you will need to verbally state your own or your sponsor's SSN. You can schedule an appointment online at ; <http://appointments.cac.navy.mil/appointment/building.aspx?BuildingId=460> or by calling (316)759-3737/1445. This is a Navy website rather than Air Force, but is the correct one.

SAFEGUARD YOUR DOCUMENTS

We all have important documents. Are yours organized? Can they be retrieved when needed? Do yourself and your loved ones a favor and get these papers in order. Here are some suggestions:

To enable you or a family member to gain quick access when necessary, store one set of your important papers at home in a fireproof lockbox or safe. You might want to store a second set in a safe-deposit box at your financial institution and give a copy to your attorney. The executor of your will should have a copy of your will, the trustee and successor trustee of your trust should have copies of the trust, and the person named in your durable power of attorney should have a copy of that document.

Update your documents from time to time as needed:

- 1-Upon the death of a family member, particularly the loss of a spouse, revisit your documents and make sure they are up-to-date.
- 2-If you move, wills tend to be pretty portable from state to state, but probate procedures might vary. A living trust might make sense in some states, but not in others. To find out, contact an attorney.

As time goes by, perhaps the person who accepted your power of attorney is no longer able to carry out the duty or has moved or passed away. Make sure your family members know not only that your documents are in a home safe or a financial institution safe-deposit box, but also know who has the combination to the safe, or the key and authorization to the safe-deposit box. Debt Reduction Moves May Threaten Military Readiness

The national Military Officers Association of America (MOAA) recently addressed concerns about how the nation's deficit reduction efforts could greatly impact military readiness. At issue are programs and policies that would degrade our military forces now and well into the future.

Issue #1: Current law will cut 30-percent in Medicare and Tricare payments to doctors as of January 1, 2012. If congressional leaders do not change the law there will be devastating results that threaten health care access for seniors and military beneficiaries. Our troops should not have to worry if their families will be able to see a doctor and receive necessary medical care. The cut in payments would certainly cause many doctors to drop current beneficiaries as patients, and greatly decrease quality of patient care.

Issue #2: Protect troops against manpower and pay raise cutbacks. There are concerns that the joint select committee for Deficit Reduction will recommend major reductions in force levels and push to cutback pay raises.

Our forces have been involved in war for 10 years and have borne 100-percent of the national wartime sacrifice. Reducing the forces would cause many of these warriors to take on additional deployments and force even more stress on military families. Cutting pay raises would penalize these same volunteers during a time of rapidly increasing food and energy prices.

Issue #3: Resist undermining crucial military career incentives: The current retirement/healthcare package is a fair concession for the extraordinary sacrifices incurred by our military forces. Some deficit-reduction panels have proposed major cutbacks in both programs.

Past cuts in such programs have had devastating results in retention and readiness. The retirement cut of 1986 had to be repealed after it hurt retention in all branches of service, and created a poor recruiting environment. Any major healthcare cuts would greatly undermine morale and welfare and would lead to further force degradation as members would have to decide if they can afford to serve our nation's military needs.

Recently three members of the Wichita MOAA chapter visited Congressman Mike Pompeo to address these issues. As a former military officer, he is well aware of the perils of not addressing these problems in a rational manner. MOAA strongly recommends that hearings should be conducted to address any readiness impacts that would occur from short-changing the aforementioned programs.

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Chained CPI: It's not a Technicality; It's a COLA CutAs I See it.

One of the most frequently mentioned options by most parties at the deficit-cutting table is a "technical correction" to the CPI called the "chained CPI." It's gone under the radar for the most part. But if implemented, it could affect the lives of almost all Americans — especially service members and Social Security recipients. This isn't a new idea. It's been pushed for years by some economists who believe the CPI overstates inflation by failing to adequately recognize that consumers change their behavior when prices of some products and services rise sharply. When that happens, economists say, people simply buy cheaper substitute products.

The case gets even stickier with many specific substitutions. Is hamburger a reasonable substitute for steak? Is a compact car a reasonable substitute for a full-size one? Is pasta a reasonable substitute for fish? Is shopping at a discount store a reasonable substitute for shopping at a high-end department store? We're not just talking about price substitution here. It's also about quality-of-life substitution, and that's where MOAA thinks a line must be drawn. Over time, this mentality leads to substantial changes in living patterns — from steak to hamburger to hot dogs to ... let's not go there.

While critics might argue this wouldn't actually happen, there's no practical safeguard to prevent it. The chained CPI would reduce retired pay and other COLAs by about one-quarter of a percentage point each year. That doesn't sound like much, until you see how that would compound over a retiree's lifetime. Military retirees and the disabled particularly would be affected because they start drawing inflation-adjusted pay at relatively younger ages. For a military retiree, switching to a chained CPI COLA would reduce total lifetime retired pay by about 6 percent. That's about \$100,000 for an E-7 retiring today with 20 years of service. A newly retiring O-5 with 20 years of service would lose about \$200,000. And that's for someone living an average lifespan (early 80s). Half will live longer, and expected longevity is rising every year.

Three other factors are relevant here, as well.

First, the Bureau of Labor Statistics already made a change to allow some relatively modest substitutions (of the peas and carrots variety) several years ago.

Second, when COLA changes (delays) previously were proposed in the 1990s, the outcry from seniors successfully won an exemption for Social Security, leaving COLA penalties to fall disproportionately on military retirees.

Third, smaller COLAs aren't the only penalty of the chained CPI, because it also would be used for tax threshold adjustments. More people shifting into higher tax brackets every year.

Some think it's the lesser of the evils we might face during the coming fiscal crunch, and that might well be true.

But MOAA feels that doesn't make it right.

School Supplies For Kids Project

From July 25 through July 29 inclusive, Wichita Chapter and TROW members distributed school supplies to service members E-5 and below for their children in grades Pre-K through 12. Additionally, supplies were provided to those Airman who are enrolled in college courses. The McConnell AFB Family Service Center solicits and assembles the supplies for the various school grades each year.

This year, the funds available were about half what they have been in the past. Still, approximately 400 kits were distributed, and the recipients were grateful for the help they received.

Everyone had a great time with the kids and are looking forward to distributing Christmas gifts to the lower ranks dependents again this December. Understanding TRICARE, Medicare and Age 65.

TRICARE and Medicare are separate programs. Medicare is health insurance for people age 65 or older, as well as for people under age 65 who have qualified for Social Security disability insurance.

TRICARE For Life (TFL) is TRICARE's Medicare-wraparound coverage available to all Medicare-eligible TRICARE beneficiaries, regardless of age or place of residence, provided they have Medicare Parts A and B. There is no paperwork associated with TFL. Beneficiaries automatically gain coverage when they meet the requirements.

Beneficiaries must sign up for Medicare as soon as they become eligible to ensure that they continue to get benefits under TRICARE. Beneficiaries turning 65 receive reminder letters from the Defense ManpowerData Center. For more information regarding Medicare sign-up, beneficiaries can call at (800) 633-4227 or go to www.medicare.gov.

While Medicare is the primary insurance when a beneficiary turns 65, TRICARE acts as the secondary insurance, minimizing out-of-pocket expenses. TRICARE covers Medicare's coinsurance and deductible. After Medicare pays its part of the claim, TRICARE pays the remaining amount for any TRICARE covered services and the beneficiary pays nothing. As the primary payer, Medicare approves health care services for payment.



What are the Threats to Your Retirement Pay and COLA?

Q. I'm already retired. Will military retirement reform affect me?

A. Even the most ambitious retirement reform proposals being discussed at this point wouldn't cut retirement payments to current retirees. But this is just the beginning of what could be many rounds of deep budget cuts. We can't say with certainty that military retirees have nothing to be concerned about.

But, one threat that we'll almost certainly face in the near future is cuts to the Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA). See more on this threat below.

Q. Will I receive a COLA this year?

A. Most likely. COLA currently stands at 3.3% for the year. Barring an economic collapse over the next two months retirees and survivors will be in line to see a COLA increase in 2012.

But pressure to produce budget savings will likely lead Congress to consider lowering or freezing COLAs at some point in the near future. They've done it before during the budget crunch of the 1990s.

There are already discussions of changing the formula used to calculate COLA to the Chain Weighted CPI (C-CPI-U). This would effectively lower COLAs by about 0.25% annually. They could also look to dust off previous budget saving initiatives like freezing COLAs entirely, delaying COLAs until age 60, or implementing a "COLA minus 1%" policy in which the adjustment is artificially lowered to save money.

All of these would seriously damage a retiree's purchasing power over time and MOAA will staunchly oppose any degradation of COLA.

Everyone must let their Legislators know how they feel about any cuts in military retirement pay.

Please continue to send your elected officials MOAA-suggested messages (available at www.moaa.org) reminding them of the importance of military retirement and other military-unique benefits, and ask your friends to do the same. We're entering an era of potentially massive budget cuts and we'll need every member to share their voice to protect earned benefits and preserve the all volunteer force.
